


Poetry at Patina

People You Should Know:Shon Fowler & Full Pull Adventures

Today we introduce you to an Onekama business that makes it easy to have fun on Portage Lake: Full Pull Adventures, and its owner, Shon Fowler.

Full Pull Adventures began as a renter of utility trailers, car haulers, dump trailers, and pontoon trailers out of their location on Kerry Road. When they began fielding questions on Facebook about pontoon rentals, they decided to expand and over the past two years, they've grown to five pontoons, with a focus on Tahoe boats. The pontoons can be used for fishing or noodling around area lakes. They also offer sunset tours around Portage Lake and fall color tours. Summer is prime season with a focus on Portage Lake, but in spring or fall, customers can rent pontoons for multiday use, or arrange for pontoons to be transported to other area lakes. Pontoons seat up to twelve, but multiple boats can be rented at one time for larger groups.

This year Full Pull began renting kayaks and developed a good base of customers at the Portage Point Resort. Over the winter, Shon is growing his kayak fleet and in 2025, will have 50 kayaks available. He has plans to open a second location in Brethren and offer kayak rentals for the scenic ride from Tippy dam to High Bridge on the Manistee River. Shon is also purchasing new Tahoe pontoons for next year's season.

Shon is a great promoter of the Onekama area, supporting other local businesses and helping his customers to fully enjoy area's resources. He gives a safety rundown and demonstration to each renter, and his equipment has all the necessary insurance and safety

equipment. He take time with each customer and one of the most fun parts of his job is getting to know his customers. Full Pull Adventures is a great community citizen, donating trailers for Onekama Days and Manistee County Fairground events.

Online reservations and payment makes it easy to work with Full Pull, and Shon is happy to provide the personal touch with his full service attitude.

Shon Fowler is originally from Manistee and graduated from Brethren High School; his wife Katy hails from Onekama. In addition to Full Pull Adventures, Shon is an ironworker, which keeps him traveling around the country. He takes off summers to work on Full Pull Adventures. Shon and Katy love off roading and are big fans of Drummond Island.

Recycling

Public Act 69 allows Michigan Counties and local units of government to enter into an agreement to fund a residential recycling program. Nine of Manistee County's communities, including Onekama Township/Village use Public Act 69 to fund their local recycling programs and are collectively known as the PA69 Recycling Program. The recycling sites located in six communities are paid for and are for use by residents of the PA69 Recycling Program communities only. View the PA69 Recycling Guidelines to see what is recyclable in these communities.

All Manistee County residents have access to the recycling drop-off site located at the Republic Services Manistee County Landfill at 3890 Camp Road, Manistee.

WILL ONEKAMA HAVE PETUNIAS IN 2025?

The "Petunia Parade" in Onekama is a long-standing tradition, initiated in 1993 by Dan and Polly Welburn. It consists of about 75 volunteers planting, fertilizing, weeding, and watering almost 4,000 petunias in ground plots for about a mile along Main Street (M-22). Locals and visitors alike absolutely love how the petunias lend a quaint appearance to our Village. This year was no exception with a lovely array of blooms along the road.

So, when the rumors started flying about M-22 being repaved, my first thought was, "How will that affect the Petunia Parade in Onekama?" Township Trustee Bob Blackmore warned of the extreme heat of the asphalt, while my thoughts were more about workers trampling the little pink, white, and magenta flowers! I contacted Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) to get the scoop and was informed that 2025 is the year for resurfacing M-22 and creating ADA-compliant sidewalk corners at intersections with Main Street in Onekama.

Debby Major and I decided to consult with Terri and Mary at Pleasanton Valley Greenhouses where we buy the petunia transplants. Terri Schmidt voiced a concern about workers trampling ANY plantings along the roadway. Her second issue was the fragility of petunias – they are vulnerable to the fumes (more so than the heat) from the asphalt even when elevated away from the ground on a shepherd's hook or hanging basket on a telephone pole. They cited their experience with this in Bear Lake.

As the summer unfolded, we solved some problems – we found a new watering person with a truck to pull the 1000-gallon water tank, replaced the hitch and tongue jack for the trailer, and got the water tank cleaned. Looking ahead to 2025, we are threatened by the loss of our water source next year and the need to keep our volunteers motivated to keep those annoying weeds at bay! You know the ones I mean – those intertwining, vicious ones with tiny flowers that want to invade everything in their path.

Currently, we think the best approach is to take a GAP year for petunias along the roadside. A gap year means that we would take a year's "vacation" from the normal process. That will allow the M-22 resurfacing project to proceed, we will be able to replenish the soil (the last time that was done was 2019), we can fix the

tires on the trailer, we can find another water source, we can resolve the algae growth in the tank, and we can give our loyal volunteers a year's reprieve from bending over on hot summer days pulling weeds.

There are always people in need of food, drink, clothes and kindness. On average, we serve about 100 people every month. We spend about \$1,500 a month for food and drink. Donations from parishioners, other churches, civic organizations, individuals and others fund our ministry. Parishioners are only a portion of the 20-25 regular volunteers, many of whom have been helping for more than 10 years, and some have volunteered month after month for over 25 years. The purpose of the food pantry is to respond to families and individuals who are residents of Manistee County, are low income and in need of food assistance

The St. Joseph Community Food Pantry, Onekama, is open the 4th Friday of each month, from 10:00 - 11:15 AM, and will be open regardless of the weather conditions.

Concerts in the Park



This year's Concerts in the Park series was a big success. The series opened with a three-band show on Sunday, June 23 to celebrate the grand opening of the Village Park's new concert stage. Doc and Donna Probes sang Jimmy Buffet songs and other beach hits, followed by local acts Truck Driver Bingo and Feral Cats Deluxe performing blues, rock, and classic Americana.

Monday night shows resumed on July 1 with west-Michigan band Schrock Brothers, who entertained the crowd with a great mix of originals and well-known classics. Mesick, Michigan duo Freshwater Roots followed on July 8 with a blend of popular covers from the sixties to 2000's. Everyone's favorite cajun/zydeco band Benzie Playboys drew a huge crowd on July 15 and, as always, had everyone dancing and singing along. Traverse City, Michigan native and longtime Concerts in the Park performer Jim Hawley brought his blend of folk and Americana to the stage on July 22. After a rainout on July 29, Elvis Tribute Artist Jake Slater performed Elvis' bets hits from the 50s to 70s on August 5. Traverse City band Fifth Gear debuted on August 12 and played a high-energy show of popular covers from the 60s to today. Manistee trio BVO Band finished the season on August 17 with a great set list of classic covers from the 60s and 70s.

Weather was great and attendance was higher than ever this year, which generated solid donations to fund next year's Concerts in the Park and other PLA events like the Petunia Parade, Fall Festival, and more. This year also saw the new addition of a kettle corn vendor, Sweet Sarah's, who will be back next year. The Concerts in the Park committee's goal was to bring a wider variety of music to Onekama this year, which was accomplished with bands Fifth Gear, Freshwater Roots, and BVO debuting along with repeat performers like Jake Slater, Benzie Playboys, and Jim Hawley.

VILLAGE COUNCIL UPDATE

Phase 2-Onekama Village Park Improvement Plan—Thanks to the public's generosity, \$25,000 in funding from both the Village of Onekama and Onekama Township, and a \$100,000 grant from the Manistee County Community Foundation, ground will be broken this fall for a new picnic pavilion at the Village Park. The new pavilion will be erected in the spring of 2025 and will be of the same design as the new event stage. It will be the same size as the old picnic pavilion, will be fully accessible, and will have lighting and upgraded electrical capacity.

Onekama Trail Project—The village continues to work with Onekama Township as a feasibility study is conducted to determine the viability of a walking/biking trail that would connect all of the township and village parks from the fairgrounds to Langland Park. A well-attended Open House was held on 29 August to introduce this project to the public. There will be other similar events for the general public where the contractor conducting the feasibility study can answer questions and receive suggestions before presenting the final study results.

Short-term Rentals—The Village Planning Committee and the Village Council have been working on the development of a short-term rental ordinance. A public hearing on that subject was held on 10 September, 2024 to get public input on the matter. There will be more to come on this subject going forward.

Village Master Plan—The Village Planning Committee and the Village Council continue to move forward with the village's contractor on the development of a Village Master Plan. A steering committee of residents and business owners has been established and met for the first time on 7 August. Stay tuned for more to come on the village master plan. THE PUBLIC IS INVITED!

Village of Onekama Master Plan Update: "Our Vision, Our Village"

The Village of Onekama kicked-off development of a new Master Plan on June 25, 2024. This meeting gave residents and business owners an opportunity to meet face-to-face with the steering committee members and consultant managing the master plan update process, Community Image Building Planning (CIB Planning). This kick-off meeting also included a strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats (SWOT) analysis. On June 26, 2024, three public listening sessions were held to obtain feedback from residents and businesses owners on topics important to them. The June 25th and June 26th sessions were well attended.

Since the June 25th and 26th meetings, CIB Planning has prepared demographic data for the Village and summarized the results of the SWOT analysis. This information was presented to the Steering Committee on August 7, 2024. Additionally, demographic and SWOT information has been posted to the Village of Onekama Website and the Village of Onekama Planning Commission Facebook page.

Responses to the Village of Onekama Master Plan survey have been excellent. As of the first week of August, over 200 people have completed the survey. The survey will remain open until November 1, 2024 in an effort to capture fall visitor thoughts and opinions. The Steering Committee will be meeting again on October 2, 2024. Topics for discussion include goals and objectives, future land use policy, future growth, among others. This is a public meeting and anyone may attend.

Opportunities for public input will continue for the next several months and we value your input. You are also invited to attend the monthly meetings of the Village Planning Commission and share your thoughts and vision for the Village of Onekama. Your feedback is important as it will help shape the updated Master Plan and together, we can establish a vision for our vibrant and resilient community.
