Lake Michigan Levels continue to climb. Currently, they are a foot above levels from the end of May, 2014 and they are projected to rise another 6 inches over the summer. Lake Michigan is 6" over its normal 50 year average level. However, we have been used to low water levels for the past 15 years. We have also been used to a lot of beach along Lake Michigan, and some areas have seen significant reduction in beach size. These are normal cycles for the Great Lakes. 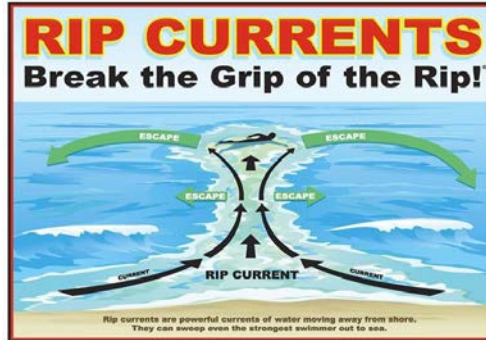

VILLAGE OF ONEKAMA COUNCIL meets the 3rd Wednesday of the month at 7 pm. at the Farr Center. Minutes for each meeting can be found at www.onekama.info.

BRUSH PICKUP: Within the Village limits, brush pickup is scheduled for the last Saturday of each month from April through October. Specifically, April 25, 2015, May 30, 2015, June 27, 2015, July 25, 2015, August 29, 2015, September 26, 2015, and October 31, 2015. Biodegradable bags must be used for lawn and garden debris. Brush is considered to be branches

smaller than 3" in diameter, small limbs, and bush and shrub trimmings. Brush must not be contaminated with metal, glass, chemicals, or other household trash. Brush is not old trees, old cedars, or old arborvitae. The Clerk and the Treasurer are available Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday from 9-2. Land use permits may be obtained by contacting Village Zoning Administrator. Hours are Wednesday 9-2.

OCS 1:1 Technology Initiative - One School Year Later

The 1:1 technology initiative is nearing the end of the first year at OCS. The Board of Education at Onkama elected to spend their technology dollars differently last year. Faced with having to replace aging computers for students, the board chose to go forward with a device for each child (1:1 concept). Previously, students were taken to one of four computer labs or, in some cases, had classroom sets of devices in particular rooms. This technology was shared and not always accessible to all students. The new concept allows every student equal access to technology tools, not only in school but expanding the use of technology to home, thus leveling the technology playing field.

Elementary students (K-5th) were each assigned an iPad and, depending on grade and age, were allowed to take them home monthly, weekly, or on a daily basis. Middle School/ High School students were assigned a MacBook Air Laptop and were encouraged to take it home daily throughout the year to complete assignments and enhance their studies at home.

Currently, the school is in the process of evaluating students, parents, and staff concerning the 1:1 initiative. Surveys are being sent out to each group to help provide information in order to make the effort by the school more beneficial. One of the things most apparent right from the beginning was the need to enhance the school's wireless network. A complete revamping and replacement of the network will be finished prior to the beginning of the next school year - funded by monies from the Manistee Intermediate School District. Additional funding has been applied for thru the Universal Service Fund, a federal program to help schools and libraries.

Many teachers and students have remarked how positive their experiences have been so far. We are now assessing whether our students being more engaged and on task can be attributed to having the 1:1 concept at OCS. The surveys will pinpoint strengths and weaknesses in the program. As with all new programs, we have learned a great deal about training, deploying, supporting, and providing technology solutions for the entire school community.

Portage Lake Watershed Forever

With Yogi Berra’s pithy observations in mind, the Portage Lake Watershed Council convened a while ago to take an in-depth look at where we’ve been, where we are going and to determine if we are living up to the goals of the Watershed Plan.

The list of accomplishments we identified gave all of us the sense that we aren’t just treading water. Highlights included controlling invasive species (phragmites and Eurasian water milfoil): purchase of the wetlands at the east end of Portage Lake; con-

tinual lake monitoring to keep a sharp eye on water quality thanks to funds generated by the establishment of the Special Assessment District; education efforts; tributary and stream monitoring; and the Explore the Shores initiative.

We also resolved to tackle several goals this year:

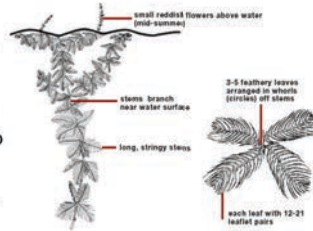
- Increase membership & community engagement

DNR EURASIAN WATER MILFOIL RESEARCH PROJECT

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) approved 20 projects statewide to the tune of more than \$4 million dollars to fight invasive species. **Portage Lake will be one of 12 lakes involved** as part of a \$330,000 grant awarded to Michigan Tech University and Professional Lake Management to test Eurasian water mil-

foil and hybrid water milfoil to find out how best to control these invasives. You will see additional surveying being done on the lake this summer by our lake management company who participated in drafting this grant application. Go to the DNR website for more details.

“ONLY RAIN DOWN THE DRAIN”

Those clever grates that we barely even notice are part of a system designed to *drain* excess rain and ground water from paved streets, parking lots, sidewalks, and roofs. Unfortunately, they are also the conduit for all kinds of pollutants that contaminate our lakes and streams. Partnering with the Portage Lake Garden Club, PLWF will be labeling storm drains this summer to draw our attention to where they are and to remind us that these workhorses aren’t to be used as convenient dumping grounds for stuff we shouldn’t even *think* about putting in the water. FROM THE FIELD . . .

PLWF Chair Mary Reed participated on the “*Restoring Native Ecosystems*” panel at the Stewardship Network 2015 Annual Meeting at the Kellogg Center in East Lansing earlier this year. The panel, made up of grassroots and professional individuals from all corners of Michigan, shared success stories about eradicating the invasive, non-native plant, Phragmites, from their community’s wetlands, shorelines and roadways. Attendees were particularly impressed with Mary’s report about the progress made in our watershed. The bottom line: reclaiming wetlands from Phragmites and other invasive plants - one property and one area at a time - has enormous positive impacts on both human and natural communities.

Could Portage Lake Be Home To A Loc Ness Monster?*



Several years ago, the PLWF purchased a program to map the bottom of the lake in an effort to understand what lies beneath the surface and how it changes as result of environmental impacts. The program is called **ciBioBase**. It is a platform that bridges the gap between the power of on-board marine electronics and the power of the web. It collects GPS data that is uploaded to servers and emerges as online charts and graphs. Chuck Reed is the resident expert on the system and has done extensive mapping of Portage Lake to supplement our lake manager's findings. CrowdHydrology in Onekama

You can help scientists track and understand the flow of water in a broad region through a project called **CrowdHydrology** by using social media to monitor stream water levels. In Onekama, five streams have been included in the research. All you have to do is look around for a ruler mounted in the water, read the measurement on the ruler at the water's surface, and text that number and the site number to 616-951-3218. Your measurement is used to create a historical record of the stream and may help to predict floods and droughts.



This appeared in 2013 but I hear that tics are even worse this year resulting in more cases of Lyme Disease being diagnosed.

TICK ALERT:

Over 20 known species of tics are in MI. If you find a tic on your body, pull it straight out with fine tipped tweezers and put it in a tight lidded container- it must be alive for testing. Take it to the Health Dept. at 385 3rd St. in Manistee. The state lab in Lansing will test it for species identification and disease. This lab work is done at no charge for MI residents.

Onekama Building Supply (the hardware store) carries Permethrin, which can be sprayed on a set of clothing and will keep tics away for up to 6 washings. Besides our backyards and gardens, tics are often found on beach grass where they find plenty of folks to land upon in the busy summer months. Check yourself and family members daily after being outside this summer.

SPRING SPORTS COME TO AN END

Onekama High School athletes had a wonderful end to the spring sports season.

The softball team won in a sweep against the Bobcats for the WMDL title. With this win, the team final record was 27-6. This means the program had the most wins of its history and completed a perfect 12-0 West Michigan League season.

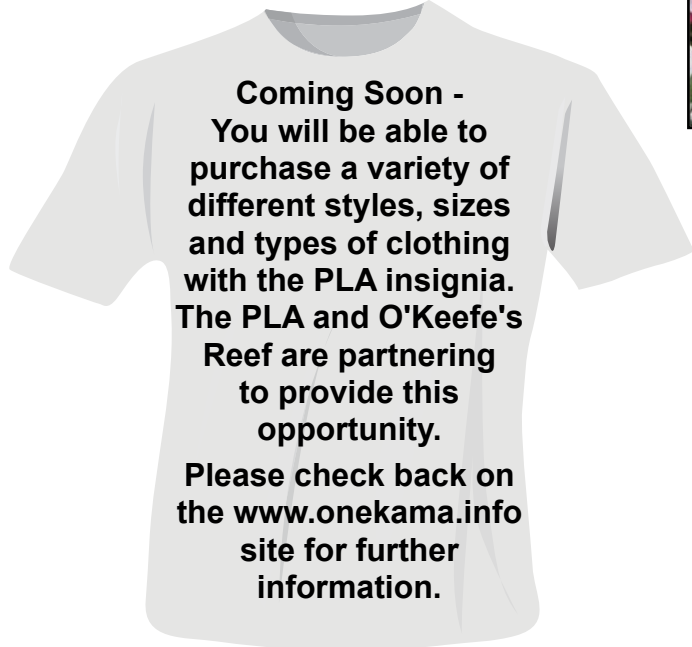

Dear Mr. O'Bryan;

I hope our letter finds you well and thank you for hosting the May 8th, 2015 meeting of the Great Lakes Navigation System. Although we were not able to personally attend the Grand Haven location we received the full report of the meeting and note a few items that we have questions and concerns about.

On page 18, "Harbor Structure Condition Assessments" you list the Costs to Restore Most Critical Harbors To Acceptable Level Of Risk. Even though the Corp of Engineers has consistently listed Portage Lake as the Harbor in MOST NEED OF INFRASTRUCTURE REPAIRS and have described it as "critical with a designation of "High Risk of Failure", we do not find it in the list (bottom left of page 18) which states cost of funding for structure repairs. As you'll recall, the current need for the Portage Lake Harbor is 6.5 million which is much lower than the average amount listed for other harbors "condition assessments". Please add Portage Lake, Onekama to this significant list of harbors in need. Also, please be sure that Portage Lake Harbor is re-listed as a recognized "Harbor of Refuge". The Portage Lake Harbor Commission has done an in depth study of the date relative to this and found that on December 11, 1883 Congress designated our Harbor as such.

Additionally, as per our meeting in Leland on February 6th, we are requesting a study be done to determine a plan for finishing the infrastructure work in Portage Lake Harbor. We would appreciate hearing from the Corp of Engineers on progress as we were told this study had to take place prior to work being done to our Harbor structure. Is there any updated information on this matter and is the Corp moving forward with this work?

Thank you for your assistance in these matters and we hope to hear from you soon.
