What does it take to become a member of the Petunia Parade Committee? A well-known face, if not a name. That is the case with Valerie Clements, our newest Committee member. Whenever I tell people it's Valerie, the response is usually, "Who is Valerie?" My response is, "You know her. The blonde, ponytail gal who walks through Onekama every day." I get a laugh, then "Yep, I DO know her!"

Then Tim, on his own, decided to walk over to the plot in front of the Onekama Consolidated Schools sign and started pulling out weeds when they needed it. In April this year, Valerie recruited Tom and Jane Foster for assistance with pre-drilling holes, planting, and weeding.

Valerie's job for the Petunia Parade Committee is to be our eyes and ears on the street. She will stay in touch about plots needing additional attention with watering, weeding, or another issue. She will also continue to be our best recruiter for new adopters of petunia plots.

The energy is always highest on planting day (that was May 24 this year). We usually have 50 to 75 enthusiastic adults and kids to get those 3,420 little plants into the soil. As the days and weeks go by and people

are busy with outdoor activities and visitors, their energy starts to wane. So, Valerie will use her upbeat and can-do attitude to encourage all of us to get the job of weeding done.



# **Portage lake Garden Club Updates**

Onekama Village Park Fountain: It is the last surviving 19th century cast iron fountain in the state. The restoration work received national and state awards. The fountain is listed as both a Michigan Historic Site and in the National Register of Historic Places.

Farr Center: Club members maintain all of the gardens and landscaping. The Butterfly and Native Plant gardens are educational as well as being a lovely backdrop for events held at the Center. The Butterfly Garden is a recognized Waystation for butterflies and other migratory species. The Memorial Brick Patio gives the community a place honor people.

Black Willow Trees: Working with Archangel Ancient Tree Archive, the club arranged for Onekama tenth grade students to learn tree cloning. Using genetic material from a champion 200 year old black willow tree in Traverse City, the students propagated over 200 trees. The students planted saplings in low-lying areas around Portage Lake, replacing trees that died during high-water years.

Environmental School: Portage Lake Garden Club and Manistee's Spirit of the Woods Garden Club partnered to host a National Garden Club Environmental School consisting of 40 hours of study divided into four courses. Open to the public, Environmental School emphasizes action for sustainable development, the interrelationship of all living things and environmental literacy. The next course is scheduled for October 2023.

Langland Park Beach Cleanup: After Labor Day, club members collect trash at Langland Park Beach. Members itemize every piece of trash so that researchers can better monitor the health of the Great Lakes.

Welcome to Onekama Signs: Located along M-22, the Welcome to Onekama signs greet residents and guests. Club members plant flowers, water and remove weeds.

Onekama Schools Sign: The club planted native grasses below the sign and maintains the garden.

For more information, please visit portagelakegar-denclub.org. New members are always welcome. Our wide-range of programs and projects means that nearly everyone can find something of interest, even those who don't enjoy traditional gardening. Although some members originate from Manistee county, many members are transplants or summer residents. We are all united by a common interest in improving and protecting the Portage Lake area.



From February to May 2023, the Portage Lake Garden Club served as project manager for an ambitious program that taught tenth grade students for Onekama Consolidated Schools how to propagate and plant champion trees. Champion trees are those that have grown larger and lived longer than what is typical. Propagating them is important because their DNA has allowed them to grow for hundreds of years, surviving climate changes and extreme weather events.

During the winter, students went to the Archangel Ancient Tree Archive and propagated over 200 black willow trees using clones from a National Champion Black Willow tree located in Traverse City. At the end of May, the students planted their black willow saplings at Portage Wetlands Park and on land owned by Portage Lake Watershed Forever. Many trees at these locations died due to recent high water levels. The black willow saplings are an excellent choice for these low-lying areas.

In addition to planting the saplings, the students learned about native and non-native species, and the challenges of maintaining a healthy environment for native plants. As an example, there are invasive buckthorn and phragmites on these sites that need to be removed and replaced with appropriate native species. Students saw the trees that died, illustrating the need for planting different tree species as the environment changes.

### **Champion Black Willow Trees for Sale**

GREAT TREES FOR PORTAGE LAKE AND SURROUNDING AREAS

Under the direction of the Archangel Ancient Tree Archive (Copemish, MI), Onekama's 10th grade biology class cloned saplings from Traverse City's 200 year old champion black willow tree. Champion trees are superstars whose DNA allows them to live longer than other trees of their species. These saplings are genetically designed to thrivel



Plant saplings in areas that are sunny and moist (near lakes streams, swamps, etc.) Black Willows are fast-growing trees, averaging 30-60 feet and are tolerant of clay, loam and sandy soils as long as ample moisture is present. Don't plant near septic fields as roots will seek out the water in the pipes. Average life is 65 years with a range of 40 to 100 years.

#### **DALA HOUSE**

This Spring, a new business with local historical significance opened in Onekama – the Dala House.

The term "Dala House" originates from "The Dala Horse", a Swedish term that symbolizes strength or good fortune. The owners of 4880 Main Street are from a Swedish descent, therefore Dala was a natural fit as it is a part of their familial history.

Originally built in 1870 as a hotel or boarding house, it truly has come full circle as it takes in travelers all over the world once again.

In 1914, the building was the base for the local telephone switchboard, when telephones were being installed in homes across the area. In the 1940s, Bill and Winona Green purchased the building and rented the rooms upstairs out as apartments, while using the first floor as their family home. Winona also opened her own beauty shop on the main floor during that time.

It switched hands a few times more before Greg Carlson purchased it in 2022. With a complete overhaul and some modern and Swedish influences, he brought the building back to its original use, a modern boarding house. Today's Dala House is ready to serve the sophisticated traveler visiting Onekama.

Some say a logger named Grund built the original hotel, and you wonder if he realized what an amazing spot he picked, as the Dala House sits right on the popular and scenic M-22 route to the North which includes Arcadia Bluffs, Leelanau Wine Country and the surrounding Traverse City area. It is also within walking distance to shops, restaurants, and beautiful Portage Lake!

# **Onekama Park Improvement Project**

The Onekama Village Council has given its approval to pursue a phased plan to make improvements to the Onekama Village Park located at Portage and Main Streets. The Village Council has committed to working with a grassroots group of citizens called Onekama Collaborative Recovery (OCR). OCR will seek private donations to provide the funding for Phase One of the project which is to construct an event stage along the park's eastern border.

Spokesperson for OCR Joe Suchocki says, "We were one of only 10 small Michigan communities selected to compete for three grants to be awarded by Consumers Energy Foundation. The grants are to be used for community improvements. Unfortunately, we weren't chosen, but Onekama Village Council and OCR still believe we can raise the \$70,000 needed for the entertainment venue to be completed."

If you've ever been to one of Onekama's Summer Concerts in the Park, then you know how badly an event stage is needed. Steve Szilvagyi, who has coordinated the summer concerts for many years, says, "We have long needed a proper venue for our great performers at the summer concerts. Not only will this phase of the park improvements satisfy that need, but it will benefit our terrific audiences as well by allowing them to enjoy the performances with their backs to the setting sun."

Fundraising will be undertaken by OCR and headed up by Doug May and John Wemlinger. The plan calls for the establishment of a yet to be named park improvement project fund at the Manistee County Community Foundation (MCCF). The fund will be managed by an advisory committee and contributions to the fund can be directed to any phase of the improvements as long as the Village Council has approved the park improvement. Donors contributing to the fund may take advantage of MCCF's status as a non-profit, 501 c 3 organization, and may consult their tax preparer for purposes of determining the eligibility of their donation as a tax deduction. Expect to hear more about the fundraising effort in the near future.

#### **CONSERVATION CLASS**

Environmental Educator, Chelsea Cooper, recently visited John Neph's sixth grade class at Onekama Consolidated Schools to discuss what happens to inland lakes in the winter.

Chelsea went out this past winter and collected samples and took videos of plankton and plants beneath the ice of Portage Lake. Then, right before visiting the 6th grade class, she went out again and collected live samples of plankton, giving the students an opportunity to make insightful comparisons between the live samples and the previously collected samples from beneath the ice. The focus was on energy cycling through the overall food web, which is one of the sixth grade's core science concepts. The students examined the live samples under digital microscopes, which were purchased by the Manistee Conservation District through a grant funded by the U.S. Forest Service. Other workshop equipment was purchased through donations from Portage Lake Watershed Forever. The students were also given some aquatic invasive species education materials.

The students gained knowledge about the pivotal role of photosynthesis and the seasonal effects on plankton and other organisms residing in the lake. They discovered that even in sub-zero temperatures, the remarkable properties of water enable our inland lakes to sustain a diverse array of aquatic life. The lesson left students with a conservation message on how citizens can contribute to the health and productivity of inland lakes.

This sixth grade workshop is the third curriculum package created and offered by the Manistee Conservation District. The MCD also offers a "Introduction to Macroinvertebrates" workshop for third grade and a "Macroinvertebrates and their Habitats" workshop for fifth grade. These curriculum packages are designed to create a hands-on field trip experience without having to leave the classroom. The curriculum packages include everything an educator would need to facilitate their own macroinvertebrate workshop and corresponds with Michigan's k-12 standards for science. The Township has several committees that you may be interested in serving on: Parks & Recreation Committee, Planning Commission, Invasive Species Committee, Zoning Board of Appeals and the Harbor Commission Each of these committees has a dedicated page on the website where you can learn more about their responsibilities.

Vacancies will be announced on the Township website and interested individuals will be able to complete an application and submit it to the Clerk for Township Board consideration and appointment. The committees are integral to the operations of the Township, and we need dedicated individuals to serve on them.

Short-Term Rental Ordinance: The Township has reviewed and revised its short-term rental Ordinance 2019-08 which governs this activity. If you rent your property on a short-term basis, you must register the property per the Ordinance requirements and obtain a permit. Noncompliance will be monitored, and fines will apply if you violate the Ordinance. The Ordinance strives to balance private property owner rights with the needs of the community.

Invasive Species: The Township continues to work with PLM Lake & Land Management to produce an annual Portage Lake Management Plan and to conduct invasive species control based on recommendations in the plan. The 2022 report can be found on the website. The invasive species control work is funded by a special assessment levied against Township property owners. The treatment program has been quite effective in controlling and reducing the level of infestation. The Invasive Species Committee is responsible for reviewing the program and making recommendations to the Township Board.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection: The Manistee Conservation District will be holding its annual Household Hazardous Waste disposal event on August 19, 2023 from 9 am to 1 pm at the Manistee County Road Commission building located at 8946 Chippewa Hwy. For more information, please visit the Conservation District website at www.manisteecd2.org/hhw. Disposing of this waste properly keeps it out of our lakes, streams, and groundwater.

**Fireworks:** The Township has a fireworks ordinance in effect that limits when and where fireworks can be used. Please be respectful of your neighbors and comply with Ordinance 2019-02If you have a fireworks complaint, please contact the Manistee County Sheriff's office at their non-emergency number (231) 723-8393.
